CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S UPDATE

Greetings,

Hope everyone had a great summer!!! Our Planning Commission has had many agenda items to vote on this summer. We are very thankful for the volunteer efforts of our Commission. It is not always easy for them to make decisions concerning land use and the developments on these lands. Just in the past few months they approved: A preliminary plat for 12 new lots for Phase 3 of the Cambria subdivision; a site plan for a new Los Jalapenos Mexican Restaurant on the west side of F&M Bank; Preliminary Master Development Plan for a 40-unit multi-family development on the north side of Deer Crossing; a site plan for a new location for White House Utility District on Business Park Drive next to Fire Station #2; a site plan for 299 lots in a new subdivision named "Summerlin" off of McCurdy Road next to the Greystone subdivision; and a Final Master Development Plan for a new 51 lot subdivision by the name of "Settlers Ridge" on Ben Albert Road; an additional 96 units at the Standard at White House apartment complex on Sage Road; a site plan for a possible expansion of our Kroger Store and a site plan for a possible new condominium(140 units)/shops at the corner of SR76 and US 31W in the town center.

Other developments happening soon or in progress include: an addition to the Tate Ornamental facility on Sage Road; a new activity center at Grace Park Church; a new retailer next to Taco Bell on Hester Drive named J & L Liquors; Uptown Wine and Spirits in the retail strip next to Kroger; Webb Business Office, a new construction, on US 31W near Town Center; Loves Travel Center to include nearly 120 seats of dine in at IHOP, Godfather's Pizza, and Chester's Chicken.

SR76 in the Interstate 65 area over the next 12 months will be challenging as coordinated efforts are underway to make improvements with additional lanes and traffic signalization. Please bear with us or seek alternate routes if possible during construction.

In ending, we are excited about the opening of our new White House Library. We were so thankful to see nearly 300 people attend the ribbon cutting. Just in the first two weeks of opening the library staff issued cards to over 400 new patrons!

Be safe, smile often, and enjoy the beautiful fall weather approaching.



Make plans to enjoy a performance by The Robertson County Band October 20th at 7:00pm in the cafeteria.



Have your septic tank pumped and septic system inspected regularly.

Check car for leaks and recycle used motor oil. Never pour it on the ground or into a storm drain.

Minimize pesticides; learn about Integrated Pest Management (IPM).

Compost yard wastes—leaves and grass; Don't dump them in ditches or waterways.

Direct downspouts onto lawns and away from paved surfaces.

Take your car to a car wash or park it on the grass to wash so that the cleaners don't run off into storm drains.

Plant grass or plants on the bare spots in your yard.

Follow directions on fertilizer labels and sweep off driveways, sidewalks, and roads so that the chemicals won't get into storm drains.

Pick up after your pet. Don't let pet waste wash into storm drains.

Many people still think that water pollution comes from a specific source called “point source” pollution like factories or sewage treatment plants but the Environmental Protection Agency estimates that now **NPS (nonpoint source pollution) is the single biggest factor affecting water quality today.**

“Nonpoint source pollution” (NPS) occurs when water from storms picks up pollutants and deposits them away from the source of the pollution. This runoff finds its way into water sources, through storm drains or directly into streams, from which much of our drinking water comes. Typical nonpoint source pollutants in suburban areas are: household chemicals, yard waste, trash, salt and sand, excess nutrients (including lawn fertilizers, septic systems and pet wastes), pesticides, cleaning, goods, grease, and auto products.

The cost of this type of pollution is reflected in higher bills, as drinking water coming from increasingly polluted sources is more expensive to treat.

Captain Ellis Harper
Confederate Army

No doubt you have seen and more than likely visited our new White House Library. It is another place we can be justly proud of in our town of White House, Tennessee. The new Library is state-of-the-art and is a focal point of learning in our City.

With the advent of the new library facility, the White House Museum is expanding to bring you more insight, knowledge and artifact displays of the life and times of White House. The Museum is closed now for renovation, but will be bigger and better than ever when it reopens. In the meantime, we would like to share bits of history and lore with you concerning our place in the great State of Tennessee.

We are in the last year of the 150th anniversary of the American Civil War. The story about to be shared was told to me some 40 years ago by a native of the area, whose name was Mr. L.D.

During the War, most areas in Tennessee had local militia-these units were referred to as Home Guards, Partisan Rangers and to some Bushwackers. That is how Mr. L.D. referred to them. Their leader was Ellis Harper. Harper was born at Richland Station (later re-named Portland by the Railroad). He was about 19 years old when he enlisted in the Confederate Army at Tyree Springs. The 30th Tennessee Infantry Regiment is where he began his service. In February of 1862, he as well as most of the Regiment, was captured at Ft. Donalson and sent to a northern prison.

Harper and others managed to escape and made their way back to Tennessee, where he fell in with Cpt. Petticord's Scouts, who were then attached to Col. John Hunt Morgan's cavalry. The story goes that Col. Morgan was so impressed with Harper as a scout, that he commissioned him as a Captain in the Confederate Army with the mission of harassing the Union Army in and around the area.

Mr. L.D.'s father was about 9 years old when he first heard and saw Ellis Harper and his "Bushwackers" and had related the following to L. D. as part of their family history. The family lived in a one room log cabin about a half mile from Two Chestnut (which can still be found on the map). The land had been in the family since the Revolutionary War and was given as payment for that service.

Harper and his troop visited the family several times during the War and would appropriate any and every thing they wanted. Food, horses, firearms, chickens, hams - anything they wanted, they took. L.D.'s grandfather could have protested, and did on the first visit, but made no attempt at protest thereafter. As a matter of fact, any time he heard the sound of gunfire and the thunder of horse's hooves, the family would head for the cellar and stay there until Harper would take his leave.

Mr. L.D. let me look at and hold a sword that his ancestor had carried during the Revolutionary War. This sword, along with a flintlock musket, was hidden several times in the hollow of an old oak tree when Ellis Harper and his men would come for a visit.

There is more to this story which I will tell you of in the next issue of the paper. It deals with six Yankee soldiers and Ellis Harper.

Home Fire Sprinklers...myths vs. facts

MYTH: "A smoke alarm provides enough protection."

FACT: Smoke alarms alert occupants to the presence of danger, but do nothing to extinguish the fire. Home fire sprinkler systems respond quickly to reduce heat, flames, and smoke from a fire, giving residents valuable time to get out safely. Smoke alarms reduce the risk of dying if a home fire occurs by about one-third. If you have a reported fire in your home, the risk of dying decreases by about 80% when sprinklers are present.

MYTH: "Newer homes are safer homes; the fire and death problem is limited to older homes."

FACT: Age of housing is a poor predictor of fire death rates. When older housing is associated with higher rates, it usually is because older housing tends to have a disproportionate share of poorer, less educated households. Statistically, the only fire safety issue that is relevant to the age of the home is outdated electrical wiring. Beyond that, age of the home has little to nothing to do with fire safety. A fire at 2:00 a.m. is just as deadly in a new home as it is in an older home. Larger homes, open spaces, increased fuel loads, void spaces, and changing building materials contribute to: faster fire propagation, shorter time to flashover, rapid changes in fire dynamics, shorter escape time, shorter time to collapse.

MYTH: "Home fire sprinklers are expensive and will make housing unaffordable, especially for first-time buyers moving to our area."

FACT: The fact is that home fire sprinklers are affordable. In 2013, the Fire Protection Research Foundation issued its updated Home Fire Sprinkler Cost Assessment report which revealed that the cost of installing home fire sprinklers averages \$1.35 per sprinklered square foot for new construction. That's down from \$1.61 per sprinklered square foot that was in the Foundation's 2008 report. To put the cost of a sprinkler system into perspective, many people pay similar amounts for carpet upgrades, a paving stone driveway, or a whirlpool bath. Sales in many U.S. communities where sprinkler systems are available show that, not only are consumers requesting this feature, but also that houses with sprinkler systems are selling faster than those without. Installing home fire sprinklers can help residents: significantly reduce property loss in the event of fire; cut homeowner insurance premiums; help qualify home for a tax rebate; and help support local fire service efforts.

MYTH: "Home fire sprinklers often leak or activate accidentally."

FACT: Leaks from automatic sprinkler systems are very rare, and no more likely than leaks from any part of a home's plumbing system. It is also rare for a damaged sprinkler system to release water, and when it happens, it is almost never an accident. Vandalism or misuse are typically involved. Furthermore, a sprinkler will not activate from exposure to a burning match or any likely event in the house other than a significant, unwanted fire.

MYTH: "When a fire occurs, every sprinkler will activate and everything in the house will be ruined."

FACT: In the event of a fire, typically, only the sprinkler closest to the fire will activate, spraying water directly on the fire, leaving the rest of the house dry and secure. Roughly eighty-five percent of the time, just one sprinkler operates.

MYTH: "The water damage caused by the sprinkler system will be more extensive than fire damage."

FACT: Home fire sprinklers can significantly reduce property loss and damage due to a fire. The sprinkler will quickly control the heat and smoke from the fire, limiting damage to other areas of the house, giving residents valuable time to get out safely. Any resulting water damage from the sprinkler will be less severe than the damage caused by water from fire-fighting hose lines. Fire departments use up to 10 times as much water to extinguish a home fire than fire sprinklers would use to extinguish the same fire.

MYTH: "Any time a smoke alarm goes off it will activate the home fire sprinklers."

FACT: Each individual sprinkler is designed and calibrated to activate when it senses a significant heat change. They do not operate in response to smoke, burnt toast, cooking vapors, steam, or an activating smoke alarm.

Winter Heating Safety Tips

As the weather cools we all know that we can look forward to another season of home heating. This is the time of year when home fires tend to increase. We want to remind everyone to be safe when heating your home this winter. Most home heating fires are avoidable by following some simple safety measures. These simple steps may save your life or your property:

- When buying a new heating unit, make sure that a qualified contractor installs it, or checks your installation.
- For wood burning stoves, have a professional inspect your stove and chimney, and clean according to the inspector's findings.
- Do not burn green wood in stoves; this may cause excessive creosote build-up.
- Keep heaters at least 3 feet from anything that can burn.
- Fuel portable kerosene heaters in a well ventilated area away from flames or other heat sources, and only when the unit has completely cooled. **USE ONLY KEROSENE**, never use gasoline.
- Make sure that gas fueled heating devices have adequate ventilation. Never use liquefied-petroleum gas heaters with self-contained fuel supplies in the home.
- Portable space heaters should be turned off every time you leave the room or go to bed.
- Allow ashes to cool before disposing. Dispose of ashes in a metal container.


MEET YOUR FIREFIGHTER:

If your dog is nervous about noises, consider crating your pet during the evening for his own peace of mind.



Costumed kids might confuse & frighten pets. Keep them away from the door. You may even want to consider using a pet gate at the front door to prevent an unplanned escape.

Younger children should always walk with an adult. Older children should always walk in a group.

16TH ANNUAL WHITE HOUSE POLICE & FIRE PUBLIC SAFETY DAY



The 16th annual White House Police and Fire Public Safety day was held on Monday, September 7 at the City Park. White House was joined by several other agencies throughout middle Tennessee.
