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CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S UPDATE

Greetings,

After nearly five months of planning the budget for fiscal year 2017 (which starts July 1, 2016) we have reached the finish line. Your Board of Mayor and Aldermen along with City staff has put together a conservative budget that keeps us financially strong for the future. Good news is there will be **no** increase in property tax! A waste water study recommended an increase in sewer rates by 3%. The storm water utility will see a \$2.11 monthly increase per E.R.U. A public hearing and second reading of the budget ordinance will be on June 16th.

We have twelve funds to manage. Sometimes I refer to them as the twelve disciples. They must be disciplined and each of them has specific responsibilities that they must fulfill. Combined we estimate that we will have available \$24.1 million. We are projecting that we will need to expend approximately \$18 million between July 1, 2016 and June 30, 2017. Some of the big ticket items that you will see manifest during the year will include: a \$2.1 million multi use path along the east side of US31W from Clearview Court to the north greenway trailhead; a \$250,000 phase two addition to the splash pad; nearly a half-million dollars in asphalt resurfacing of city streets; a \$450,000 fire engine; over a million dollars in improvements to our sewer system; \$75,000 towards renovations to the Museum/Chamber facility. What you may not notice is that we are investing \$160,000 into engineering design work on widening SR76 from McDonalds to Interstate 65.

I always like to end on economic improvement issues. You are now starting to see development along SR76 between the Kroger complex and Lone Oak. As I mentioned in our last issue there will be three businesses: Los Jalapenos, Dairy Queen, and Wash & Roll car wash. If all goes well we should be able to start using their services later this summer. Sage Road is seeing activity as the 20,000 square foot office building gets finished. Tate Ornamental will have a new painting building going up and the 96 unit addition to The Standard at White House Apartments will be in full swing. Along the 31W corridor we anticipate White House Utility District finishing up there new pipe yard and training facility. We should expect to see new condominiums/apartments going up on each side of Deer Crossing.

In closing take a deep breath to relax, sip some ice tea or lemonade, and enjoy the beauty of summer.



A new columbarium in Hillcrest Municipal Cemetery means White House residents have another option when considering their final resting place.

The solid granite columbarium, which weighs about 7,000 pounds, will hold cremated remains in 48 niches.

It was added to the Hillcrest Municipal Cemetery in March 2016 to provide residents a less expensive, cremation specific option.

While niches cost about the same as grave plots, the niches will be less expensive because there is no charge for a headstone and labor. The niches are also large enough to accommodate two family members who want their ashes together.

The Cemetery Board noticed an increase in the amount of cremations taking place and decided another final resting place option was needed.







Our White House Police Officers have been out in full force this spring hosting several different community programs.

The 2016 Citizens Police Academy kicked off in early March with 26 citizens enrolled. The purpose of the Citizens Police Academy is to better communication between citizens and police. Graduates of the academy can share their knowledge and experiences with the community as the opportunities arise. Each course consists of one 3-hour class held each week for duration of ten weeks. Certified police officers and civilian instructors with particular expertise conduct classes on each topic. The next Citizens Police Academy will take place in early 2017.

Sgt. Eric Enck along with other White House officers and local instructors have been making their way around White House schools teaching S.P.E.A.R.E. classes and educating young women. Following a lecture on **Self-Protection, Environmental Awareness, and Rape Education** Sgt. Enck leads an interactive defense tactics class that focuses on techniques anyone can employ. D.A.R.E. Officer, Sgt. Enck and Daren (the D.A.R.E. mascot) visited White House Middle School for a 10 week program to help teach students good decision making skills to help them lead safe and healthy lives.

The 11th National Prescription Drug Take Back was a huge success! The White House Police Department collected over 99 pounds of un-used and expired prescription medication from White House citizens. The total number of law enforcement participation for this campaign was 4,264, there were 5,359 collection sites, and 893,498 pounds of un-used/expired prescription medication collected.

Let's take a ride in the way back machine and visit the early 1960's. It was a time when a computer was as big as a truck, McDonald's was a new place to eat (there wasn't one here), and there was no I-65. Most of us did have television though back

then and we could watch a variety of entertaining programs like football, baseball, basketball, cowboy shows and even prize fighting on one of the three Nashville stations. Which brings us to our tidbit of White House History. Not much happened around here when I was a boy, and when something out of the ordinary did occur, it became a *red letter* day, at least for a while.

The most spoken about revered prize fighter of the era (or probably the 20th Century), was none other than Cassie Clay. Perhaps the greatest prize fighter of all time. He would, later in the decade, change his name to Muhammad Ali. Today, prize fighting doesn't seem to be as popular as it was in those days. At least it's not talked about as much.

Most folks around here were Sonny Liston fans, at least before the title fight. Liston was the one that Clay won the Heavy Weight title from. Liston was quiet and reserved as I recall, from seeing him on TV. On the other hand, Clay was a bragger and always had something to say. He even made up little rhymes. The one I remember most was "float like a butterfly, sting like a bee."

It was a warm, late summer day in about 1963. I was in school. The building is no longer there, but was located near the new White House Library. At that time, Highway 31W was the "I-65" of the times, so there was as much traffic then as is now. Across the street was Horace Ray's filling station (as places to get gas were called back then). Today there is Marathon Market there. The school room I was in faced the highway. I and everyone else in the class noticed a huge bus pull in the lot across the road. It looked like a greyhound, but wasn't. The amazing thing about this was it had "Cassie Clay, World's Heavy Weight Champion" written in big letters on it. We kept watching and after a few moments passed, we could not believe it. There he was. A head taller than everyone else. Cassie Clay himself. It looked like his manager Angelo Dundee was there too. The World's Heavy Weight Boxing Champion was at Horace Ray's Station.

At this point, the teacher had to call the class back to order. It was such a big deal that the teacher in the next classroom, Ms. Barbara, sent Sammy to get Clay's autograph for her husband. Apparently a teacher could do that back then. Sammy was a minor celebrity for a day or so after that. Clay was in there maybe fifteen minutes or so. When he came out of the station, he was carrying a grocery sack, as were most of the others in his entourage. Later, the word was that he bought a few refreshments and bags full of fireworks, telling Horace Ray something to the effect "you might see me on the evening news. We're going to shoot them in down-

town Louisville. You cannot buy fireworks in Louisville," he said as he left.

I guess it doesn't sound like much nowadays, but this was a big deal for White House back then. A world renowned celebrity actually came to White House, even if he was only here for twenty minutes. You might find an old timer that still remembers it and somewhere in a scrapbook, in a drawer in somebody's house, there is a piece of paper with the words "Cassie Clay" written on it TO PROVE IT.

Remember to visit your White House Library often and then the White House Museum too when it reopens in the near future. We'll be back in the next edition with more.
